A NOTE FROM THE ARTISTS

Today's art is contemplating the sense of holding someone in prayer. In the beginning of Colossians, Paul is writing to the people creating church in Colossae. He writes to them from prison in Rome¹, where he is being held for sharing the gospel. Throughout the text he implores God to extend favor to the Colossians and he simultaneously thanks God for their presence and their work in the early church.

To visually represent a letter, we thought about salutations, notebook paper, and envelopes. I recalled the airmail paper on which I wrote when sending letters home from France. My grandmother and I had taken a trip to the Mediterranean coast for a month. I cannot remember what I wrote home about, but over the weeks I filled those airmail pages with thoughts, observations, yearnings, and reports. The paper was a middle blue, like the sky between the horizon and the sunlight. It had a plethora of lines: horizontal, vertical, and diagonal. The lines were subtle so that the correspondence script would show beautifully, calligraphically leaning on the guides.

Today, we see in the art an exploration of the idea of holding a person in prayer. The guiding lines are subtle, Paul's words to the Colossians repeat throughout the page affirming and reaffirming the challenging and difficult work of being church in the world. The glow of the light beyond uplifted hands represents God toward whom we hold our prayers. Beyond and around the focal point wraps reiterated light representing the strength of our hearts when joining God in embracing the person who needs to be prayed for. What does holding a person in prayer look like to you? What do you see when you pray?
